

### Boomtown: Hard to describe, easy to fall in love with.

In the early years, like many people, I was concerned about background noise, potential traffic disruption and stories of drug misuse. More recently, however, I began to hear a more balanced view, from friends and friends' children who had been. Last year our eldest daughter volunteered to steward, through Oxfam. In exchange

for three demanding eight hour shifts, over the four days, she and a friend had full access to the festival. She came back tired, but having seen it all,



was hugely enthusiastic about the event, the site, the organisation and the people who attend, so this year I





was determined to get a ticket and go and see for myself.

Due to the progression of my MS I am now a full-time wheelchair user so the logistics of going to an event like this aren't straightforward; I can't camp (a blessing with the weather we had this year!) and I need a significant amount of help. From the moment I emailed Boomtown, last November, and said I wanted a ticket and that I was disabled, they have been brilliant. They have



one person, the wonderful Jos, who is responsible for making sure the 200+ disabled people attending Boomtown, have the best time possible. Each day I went I needed convenient parking for my car and trailer and an experienced carer/ family member to help off load and load my cross-country mobility scooter and look after me on-site. I was issued the required carer tickets and entry was through the much

less busy and more convenient south entrance. Once on site I was reasonably independent but Boomtown offer help if you need it, they have disabled viewing platforms at the main venues with charging points to top up exhausted wheelchair batteries, and run a wheelchair friendly bus service throughout the site.

So how was the event itself? It was fantastic! I went for up to six hours every day and each day was different and there was still lots I didn't see. The size, uniqueness, diversity, scope and scale of the site was breathtaking. There were a dozen or so different districts and each one, from the Medieval Old Town, to the dystopian Sector 6, had its own character. The attention to detail and quirkiness of it all was outstanding. If you weren't into the music, just to go round the site soaking up the atmosphere and the costumes of the Boomtown actors and the other festival goers would have been an event on its own.

But of course there was also the music.



I am definitely not the person to write about the music, my tastes are erratic and noisy, but with nearly 30 separate music venues there is a huge range and I found plenty that I really enjoyed. One of my favourites was a small band, "The Tribe" playing at The Bandstand, one of the smallest stages. They nevertheless managed to attract a crowd of enthusiastic supporters.

And the negatives; the weather, but it didn't stop the constant party vibe; inevitably there are drugs taken at festivals but Boomtown is making huge efforts to try and counter it with extensive entry searches, drug testing and 24 hour medical centres; it is expensive, as you can only buy tickets for all four days. But for an entertaining and stimulating weekend of pure theatre, coupled with the fact that it is so close and accommodating to disabled people, it is definitely worth it. Boomtown gave me an unbelievable opportunity to do something different and amazing and I will be first in the queue for tickets next year. James Woosnam

#### Report from Winchester City Council Councillor Kim Gottlieb about Boomtown

The Saturday night curry (from Shapla of course) is usually followed by a slump on the sofa and a struggle to stay awake for Match of the Day. Last Saturday I taped MoD and set off on

my annual visit to Boomtown. Although the Council has noise meters set up the whole weekend all around at strategic locations, and an



on-site monitoring office, I like to do my own survey driving around the villages (Itchen Abbas, Avington, Easton, Martyr Worthy, Chilcomb, Cheriton, and elsewhere in Alresford and around) sitting for a few minutes with the engine switched off, trying to gauge whether the noise would keep me awake at night. It's all very inexpert but, happily, for the most part the answer is "no". I do, however, accept that others will have a different perception and that, particularly when the wind direction and/or strength changes, for some the noise can be unduly irritating.

Going onto the site, it's difficult not to be impressed by the whole operation. It's not just the multitude of music and entertainment venues, not that I lingered at any, but all the infrastructure. Everything that 50,000 concert goers need has to be thought through and planned for. From water supplies to an immense recycling plant, it all functioned as a temporary city served by another 25,000+ support staff. Drug misuse is one of the main issues and it is of concern to all councillors. Much effort is made to prevent them being taken into the venue, but there is always a quantity that is smuggled in. This year a testing station was set up whereby folk could, on a voluntary basis, get their drugs tested so that they could find out what the drugs they had kept back actually contained. They were then given

advice about what was pure and what was potentially lethal. I don't know the details of all the testing, but I understand that this modern approach was considered a great success. My overall take on things is that this event is enjoyed by many thousands of people, and that for all the traffic and other issues and misfortunes that do occur from time to time, the net result is a very positive one. I am of course still happy to discuss the matter with

#### From the Parish Council

The full Parish Council does not meet in August unless there is an urgent need. That does not mean that all work is put on hold. Routine



work such as answering emails goes on. Planning applications come in and whether we decide to comment or not, plans have to be looked at and neighbours visited. If you have made a planning application, as soon as you receive the orange notice, please see that you put it up immediately in a place where it can be clearly seen. There can be problems if you fail to do so.

Boomtown has just finished so it will be useful to receive comments before the next meeting with the organisers which takes place on 10 September. The hot weather (which may of course be a distant memory by the time you read this) has caused a problem with the surface in front of the basketball ring at Couch Green, hence for safety it has had to be cordoned off. The

easiest solution is for it to be repaired, however the question has been raised as to whether this piece of play equipment is regularly used, or would it be better to replace it with something more popular. There was the idea of a zip-wire, but apart from the cost, having to have the area fenced makes this a non-starter. Please let us know what you would like to have there, especially if you have young children who use this playground. We are also looking at how we can improve the King George V playing field at Couch Green, both in the long term as well as what we need to do in the more immediate future now the old and dilapidated changing rooms have gone. Storage space for equipment is needed and possibly some other facilities. Naturally this would require a significant amount of funding but in our view a worthwhile project for the long term benefit of all. If you have ideas and views on this please talk to your councillors.

While thinking of councillors and looking at the list on our new website,

you will see that we still have a vacancy. It can also be seen that, in terms of distribution, one village is well represented, another has two councillors while two villages have only one each. Despite asking several people from each of those villages, no one else, so far, has been willing to represent them. So, if anyone from anywhere in the Valley wishes to join the Parish council, please let me know. That may, of course, result in further imbalance but if those from the underrepresented villages do not volunteer, the result is inevitable.

Among those who have served in the past was Andrew Kennedy, who will be much missed in the Valley. He made a huge contribution as the Chairman of Finance and General Purposes committee, he designed the accounting reports we still use today, worked hard to improve the governance arrangements of the council, and he played a major role in creating the licence under which the Old School Field is operated.



#### Report from Winchester City Council Councillor Margot Power

Wild Flowers on Public Land. Itchen Valley residents have complained that native flowers planted to decorate our roadsides, have



been mown before setting seed. Where these have been planted on highways land, that is mostly verges, a licence is necessary from Hampshire County Council. If the land is inside a 40 MPH limit the cutting is contracted to Winchester City Council and you need to inform them of the licence, as Hampshire rarely do. Then mowers will avoid cutting until seed has been set. If the land is owned by Winchester City Council permission is also required.

I have maps of what Winchester will cut and when, and how to apply for wild flower areas; email me on mpower@winchester.gov.uk if you would like a copy.

Less Welcome Wild Flowers. I have received many complaints about weeds, not only unsightly in town centres but also damaging to paved surfaces. In order to save money, Hampshire decided to spray weeds only once a year, this year of course, due to the exceptional weather, most weeds have set seed and died, so the spraying will have limited benefits. Some of us have decided to attack the weeds ourselves and immediately improved our surroundings. As Local Authority funding is reduced year on

year cuts have had to be made, I think we will all need to do more to make our close environment a better place for all.

#### From the Riverbank

Perhaps like me, you may have looked at the river Itchen & marvelled at how it continues to flow so well despite the relentless heat and lack of rain throughout these last few months. Fortunately, all the rain that fell last Winter, particularly in March and April when we all got fed up with muddy footpaths and endless dark days, topped up the chalk aquifers that have provided a steady flow of water throughout this summer. The good flows and abundant sunshine have promoted the right conditions for a healthy growth of aquatic weed that offers refuge for fish, and hosts many of the invertebrate creatures that live in the river. By mid summer, thanks to the sheer volume of weed, the water level rises, & is quite often at a higher level than in mid winter. These elevated summer water levels maintain a high water table providing ideal conditions for all those beautiful chalk

stream plants to flourish beside the river. Unless the rains properly set in, flows will inevitably drop off as Autumn approaches and river keepers, mindful of this, will need to cut the weed carefully for fear of lowering the level too much and ending up with a mass of tangled weed on the surface of the water. #### Rainfall and River Flows



Perhaps not considering the consequences. I mentioned to our esteemed editor that I had a rain gauge. Inevitably a few days later a request came to pen a few words on rainfall in the Itchen Valley and its effect on river flow in the Itchen. In the distant past the then National Rivers Authority provided a number of observers with Casella Rain Gauges which measure rainfall to an accuracy of 0.1 millimetre. Subsequently they abandoned the idea of having a network of private observers, but let them keep the gauges. For the past 21 years I have been one of the

beneficiaries of this state sponsored largesse.

Although the monthly rainfall throughout the year is important for farmers and gardeners, for the Itchen the key months are in the winter, usually considered as October to March. with vegetation, and trees in particular, not taking up most of the rain, as they do in the summer months. In consequence the rain goes straight

into the chalk. Chalk rivers, which stretch from Poole harbour round the coast up to Yorkshire, depend on this winter rain to maintain flows in summer.

#### River Flows

Most rivers gain the major part of their flow from run off from fields and developed land. Chalk rivers are unusual in that they depend mainly on

springs fed from the chalk aguifer. Run off is relatively low for the Itchen, although in very wet conditions, or following heavy rainfall, it can benefit from rain falling on the valley which then flows through the peat and gravel in the valley floor. This effect normally only lasts for a week or so unless the wet conditions persist. The reliance on the flow from the chalk aguifer coupled with a 2017/18 winter rainfall of 42.8cm explains why, in spite of a very dry summer, the flows in the Itchen have held up relatively well. In addition, river keepers will adjust their weed cutting to maintain river levels in times of low flow. Some weed cutting however is essential for flood defence. The river also gains some flow from abstraction to feed watercress beds as well as the outflows from three major sewage treatment works. The Environment Agency used to abstract water from the chalk aguifer and put it into the river in the Candover catchment to increase river flow downstream at Chickenhall Eastleigh sewage treatment works as otherwise the river would have been unacceptably polluted. However following a multimillion pound revamp, this dilution is no longer necessary and the EA have abandoned the abstraction. Further information on river flows in England is published monthly by the EA on their website. lim Glasspool

The Practical Gardener

I suppose we are all in a learning phase this year, flood, cold, drought, heat, so I wonder what is next. Certainly many plants have coped well with our summer. We all have to think long and hard about water management as using vast amounts of potable water for

gardens cannot be the solution. So we are in the time of harvest but many of us have been doing this progressively since the spring. Glut is the term I apply to fruit and it seems sad to throw away apples which nobody wants, but the trees are laden. I had to construct a support for my



Victoria plum (reminiscent of my scouting days). The difficulty is harvesting at height but once again my 20 step tripod ladder is valuable. I'm trying to train the grandchildren to climb branches in the apples trees! Last month I said praises of a glut of tomatoes but in spite of watering even four times a day some of the fruit has had blossom end rot. The text books say it's down to lack of water; I have other ideas. Some of the fruit has split so more issues; the joys of growing your own food. Keeping the

greenhouse cool in recent weather has been difficult in spite of vents, a fan and a water spray.

flower borders and see what is growing well, what has produced good blooms and what might be divided in the winter. I do the same with annuals, what works well and is easy to grow. I'm still struggling with germination, convinced it's not technique. There is a certain satisfaction about growing your own plants rather than getting everything from a nursery. It's also a time to dead-head to create new blooms. That seems to be essential for most flowers.

I try hard to educate the grandchildren as to where fruit and vegetables come from, to show them how things grow and how to harvest. We do need to show that food doesn't originate in a supermarket plastic bag.

#### David Humphrey


David Humphrey, a resident of Itchen Abbas since April 1976, died on 20 June from Motor Neurone Disease. A family cremation was held, which was followed by a memorial service on 25 July at St John's Church.

David was born on Valentine's day in 1939 to John and Bertha, growing up on their poultry farm in Twyford. He joined his father straight from school, soon running an egg farm at

Kingsworthy. Throughout the 60s, 70s and 80s he and his brother expanded the business, purchasing rearing and laying farms across the south, taking the total laying bird capacity to 1.4 million laying birds.

David was not just involved in the business, but in the wider poultry sector, becoming a director of the British Egg Marketing Board (they who put the little lion on eggs and ran brilliant TV adverts with Tony Hancock promoting eggs), and was still a member when the board was closed in 1971. David held numerous commercial directorships and chairmanships in the poultry sector. David was very involved with the National Farmers Union, sitting first on the local poultry committee, then joining the national NFU Poultry Committee ultimately taking on the role of chairman.

David left the family business towards the end of 2001, but continued to take an interest in the poultry sector in general, and the family business in particular. He remained proud of the development of the business, with the expansion of the specialist feed business, the growth of the pullets business, and the diversification in property rentals as well as the building of homes, and would regularly say, `that is just modern farming, diversification with a different harvest'. David met Susan Grace, when she came to a party in the house that was to be their first home together. Sue was the last of a line of ladies (five others) that he subjected to the `South Pacific test'. She liked the film and agreed to see David again, and within 6 weeks, on a chaperoned visit to the Lake District, agreed to marry him! David and Sue had 3 sons, two of whom are in the family business. They



have 7 grandchildren and currently one great grandchild. Whilst the family were growing up there were many fondly remembered family holidays spent on boats in the Helford River, as well as holidays abroad.

Beyond work and family, there were other interests, including bridge, as well as golf at Hockley and at their other home in La Manga, Spain and again he took responsibility, becoming president of his community. One of David's lasting testaments is closer to home, Itchen Abbas Village Hall. David was pleased that it is no ordinary village hall, being one of just two 'Beacon' Village halls, as deemed by the national lottery, for the Millenium. David helped guide and run the funding and building project and was ably supported through the development by Vernon Tottle.

David had two facets to his personality, the professional straight man, and the fun man who enjoyed a full and rich and varied social life. Sue thanks the many people who wrote to give their condolences, many of whom stated how, and in what circumstances David helped them in their lives or careers.

The words that came up in the letters and cards time and time again, were 'charming', 'kind', and 'gentleman'. One writer used another word: cantankerous and it was right, as he indeed could be. Why? Because he was a man of principle and would argue for that principle, sometimes frustratingly beyond reason! But that is what made him true – a true rock of a man.



#### From our MP

Sustainable local communities are important to Winchester and its surrounding villages. And right at the top of that list sits a



good mix of shops and, above all, independents, working alongside the national chains.

Recent months have seen a real push, in Winchester especially, to support these traders and the Winchester Independents High Street Market — held on a scorching Sunday in July - saw around 30 businesses make use of a free high street stall for the day. It was great to see the daily market stalls — almost all of them imports to Winchester — replaced with local businesses and, because they are just that and know so many of their customers, there was a fabulous atmosphere in town.

The kids and I spent a number of hours chatting with traders and, from what I could gauge, there would be a huge appetite to do this more regularly. It's not the whole answer to our retail challenges, and no one is pretending it is, but we could support them a great deal more and I intend to get in the middle of discussions with Winchester BiD and the City Council about how we do that.

And we must not forget our market towns, such as Alresford, in all of this and small independent traders in the villages who provide so much more than a newspaper or a loaf of bread. They're about sustainable, healthy, communities and they should be the future as much as the past.

Retail is certainly changing and that's not peculiar to Winchester; competition, especially from online, makes it a harder 'sell' than it was. I sometimes hear blame for this changing environment laid at the door of WCC around rent and rates but this doesn't stack up. Government sets the rate and private landlords – including charities we may support, private individuals we may be and pension funds we may even rely on – set the rent. And behind every retail closure there's an individual story that explains what happened.

For us in Government, it's the trend we must spot and – where possible – act upon. The recent rates revaluation has hit many but, of course, reflects the prosperity of Winchester and that's a double-edged sword. It was also long overdue and that must change which is why I supported plans to move to more regular revaluations because we cannot have cliff edge spikes like 2017 ever again.

Yes there has been a discretionary relief scheme, which I pushed Treasury to create, but I remain of the view the fundamentals of business rates need to change. The new Retail Sector Council is bringing the sector together with Government and local councils, making recommendations on the areas that come up time and again. Those include business rates, where the Government have made a clear commitment to make sure that the system is up to date for a world in which people increasingly shop online. To save money, Hampshire County Council has decided not to support free school transport for 'new' children until they are of statutory school age (ie: for children travelling more than two miles to school in the term after they are 5) from September 2019. Although this seems a long way off, this may be an important consideration for parents choosing a school for September 2019, for example, if you work near a school other than your local one. The new policies on transport cover all agesyou can see it on www.hants.gov.uk search 'transport to school'.

Walking to school is one option, but for children walking alongside a main road, even with parents, fast cars, big vehicles and nettles can be scary. I want to walk to school with a child at least once in every month of this academic year to get a sense of the child's experience. I would be pleased to share your school journey on request.

It was heartening to hear from Paula Stopinski (see picture page 32) from the Hospice Campaign that donations for the Winchester Hospice offering inhouse and Hospice at Home care, are gaining pace. Electric Car charging is a hot topic right now. The County is looking at the best way to provide electric points, initially for their own fleet cars, then spreading out to everyone. Modern technology could give new meaning to 'on street charging'. More of this in future articles.

You will have seen the publicity regarding the difficult state of Finances at County Councils across the country. One of the Council's Statutory duties is to dispose of waste, including the provision of at least one recycling centre within the county boundary. When Winchester City Council organises kerbside collection of your household rubbish and recycling, they pass it to Hampshire County Council to dispose of it. Most of the black bin waste (including yogurt pots etc) go to the Chineham incinerator to be burnt at high temperatures, the resulting energy generated is used to supply power to local households. The clinker from that process is used in road building.

The contents of your green bin: card, paper, tins, plastic bottles with a neck etc) are sent to plants across the UK

that recycle it. The cost of recycling (and the profit or loss from the markets for the resultant product) is part of what your council tax is spent on. The question is: should we recycle ALL plastic- or burn the smaller pieces (like yoghurt pots)? Let me know so that I can reflect your views at HCC. The Council seems to have been 'behind the curve' on grass cutting all this summer, and it is frustrating to see the junction sightlines hidden by higher grass, old signage and ragwort. Please go to www.hants.gov.uk to report the problem (all instructions to the contractors are started online now) so this is the most effective way to get it on the system. 

Dr Saunders will be working all day Monday, Thursday and Friday and on Tuesday mornings.

#### Flu Vaccination Campaign 2018/9

It will soon be time for flu jabs. This year, there are changes to the vaccination programme.

We will be offering different vaccines from those given last year, and there are different vaccines for patients who are 65 and over (date of birth before or on 31st March 1954) and those who are under 65 and have a condition which puts them at risk should they contract flu (including pregnant women). In addition, we do not have a choice about our delivery schedule so we have to work within these constraints. Please bear with us. There will be 2 walk-in clinics at the surgery this year on Wednesday 3 and Wednesday 10 October from 1.00-2.30. These will be for patients who are 65 and over only. There is no need to worry about getting here early, as we will continue to vaccinate all through the clinic and patients who find it difficult to stand may wish to come at 2.00pm when there is less likelihood of having to queue.

We will be organising bookable clinics in October, November and December for the patients who are under 65 and at risk, and those older patients unable to attend the walk-in clinics which may include late afternoons and Saturday mornings for patients who are at work. Child flu clinics will run very similarly to previous years with 2-3 year olds

and 2-17 year old at risk patients being vaccinated at the surgery while children in year R to 5 will be vaccinated in school by the School Nursing Team. Patients who are eligible for vaccination at the surgery will receive a letter from us. We are unable to vaccinate children who have missed their vaccination at school unless they are at risk, but School Health will run catch-up clinics and you can contact them if necessary.
