

### **Easton WI**

Jill Daniels gave us a magical mystery tour around Winchester at our March meeting, highlighting interesting facts of our beautiful city. She suggested that when visiting new towns, we should look up - as in the High Street above Lloyds Bank, the black clock was presented to the city after a royal visit in 1713. Originally fired by gas, the curfew bell still rings at 8pm every night. Just behind the clock is a niche with a statue of Queen Anne. Looking up at the corner of Southgate Street, there is a replica of the Black Swan carving which was situated on the original Black Swan Hotel and is where Arthur Conan Doyle stayed while researching his book 'The Adventure of the Copper Beeches' in 1892. The Westgate, built in the 12<sup>th</sup> century,

is one of the two surviving fortified gateways into Winchester and was still

in use until 1959. The statue of Alfred the Great, King of Wessex, welcomes visitors to the town. He made sure England had enough ships to fight the Vikings and gave peace at the time. The statue was sculpted by Hamo Thorneycroft, cast in bronze, and it was erected in 1899. The Cathedral was built under the instruction of William the Conqueror, the font being imported from Belgium in the 12<sup>th</sup> century depicting the story of St Nicholas.

Dating back to the 15<sup>th</sup> century the Buttercross was where locals came to sell their produce and in the 17<sup>th</sup> century a small riot was organized to prevent its removal. It was then preserved for the City and is now a listed building.

John Keats enjoyed walking over the water meadows, which inspired his poem, Ode to Autumn, in 1819, and of course, Jane Austen is buried in the Cathedral.

Jill suggested joining the Heritage weekend trail to see inside many of the historical buildings not normally open to the public.

Our next meeting on Thursday 2 April is a group meeting when we welcome members from the four other institutes in the Alresford area.

Not to mention the spacious stables themselves which are beautifully designed with generous amounts of room and space for up to five liveries. Our horse Misty has never had it so good.

When the riding school opens for business in a week or two, Fran will be offering memberships with discounts on events and lessons. There will also be clinics, ticketed lectures and demos. She caters for all ages of children and adults and is Pony Club affiliated. There are also job opportunities for qualified instructors. This is a wonderful facility to have on our doorstep and a thriving local business. Huge congratulations to Fran for getting this off the ground after five long years. 

Firstly our local Councillor requested our views in about 2014 with regards ways of improving the Cart and Horse Junction. I immediately replied with a motorist's view and simply said reduce the speed and put lighting in place. Thankfully four years later these improvements were put in place and it is my belief that the junction is now a lot safer.

I would like to highlight my belief that reducing the speed helped but the main improvement I believe is the lighting as this was a very dark double junction and I don't have the stats but I believe there were more accidents or incidents in the dark.

So, as has been previously stated, the council then changed layouts off the two junctions where nobody really knows who has right of way, as we know the general highway code states give way to traffic from the right but of course this can't work on these junctions. So a simple solution would be to put two mini roundabouts in place so giving way to right can certainly be adhered to.

# Obituary Alan Jordan 1931 - 2020



Alan qualified as a doctor in 1956 from St Georges before spending 2 years National Service at War Office and then entering general practice in Finchley, where the senior partner was the aptly named

Doctor Nurse. It was only when Alan got this stable job that his father would allow him to get married, although he and Florence had met when he was 15 and they were both having maths tuition with consecutive lessons. He took to lingering after his lesson so that he could see her home. They celebrated their 60<sup>th</sup> wedding anniversary in May 2019.

As a GP for 37 years, he had the largest practice in Finchley and was absolutely loved by his patients. His children remember his dedication to duty, being on call every Monday and Thursday night, going out to calls with his gardening clothes on over his pyjamas. He rarely seemed to have an uninterrupted night but would always go straight to work the following morning

For many years, Alan was chairman of Local Medical Committee and as such had meetings with his local MP, Margaret Thatcher and at times was invited to No. 10 to discuss views on the impact of changes on general practice. Apparently Margaret Thatcher was rather taken aback at how pleasant

he was (perhaps expecting some left leaning medical activist!). But in his inimitable and gentle way he once floored the PM referring the matter back to Secretary of State at the Department of Health. This was the inception of Trust status and Alan cautioned that GP health delivery would never be the same again if this model was used.

On his retirement in 1994, Alan and Florence moved to Little Hayes in Itchen Abbas. They were so happy and really appreciated the welcome they got. They threw themselves into village life in its many forms, Alan serving as a wise and much valued Churchwarden of St Johns and running the British Legion Poppy collections for many years. He took up golf and loved and was rightfully proud of his garden. In 2014 Alan and Florence moved to a newly built house in Goodman's Court in Alresford, it could not have been a more appropriate address.

### Carving in memory of Elsie

When we discovered that the large ash tree in our garden had Ash Dieback, we didn't simply want it felled and forgotten about. It was a beautiful tree and our daughter had enjoyed a few precious weeks sitting under the shade of its branches shortly before she died in August 2019.

We decided it would be a fitting tribute to commission a memorial chair for her, where we could sit and look out towards St. Mary's churchyard, where she's buried.

As soon as we saw the work of Matthew Crabb, Chainsaw Artist (matthewcrabb.com), we knew he was the person we wanted to design and create Elsie's whimsical, woodland scene.

With very little to go on apart from pictures of the tree stump and some measurements, Matt sketched an idea which we loved!

However, when it came to carving, the tree stump revealed knots, rotten patches and crevices which meant the design evolved over time.

Matt was amazingly adaptive and it was wonderful to see his creative mind ticking away as he faced new challenges.

He worked over a week through heavy rain and bitter frost and we were astounded by what he achieved. Friendly creatures, such as the little owl peering out of its hole, a sleeping fox and mischievous squirrel play their way around the three dimensional sculpture. Although we didn't initially intend there to be an eagle at the very top, it now gives us comfort seeing this strong figure keeping a watchful eye over our precious Elsie Lark. We still need to protect the carving

with danish oil, when the weather improves and the rain holds for long enough. This will mellow the colour of the wood and ensure it lasts for many years to come.

We have been overwhelmed by the number of supportive comments from neighbours and passers-by. We didn't think you'd be able to see it above our mature hedge, so when we realised you could, we were relieved that it didn't offend!

Thank you to the Valley News for sharing our story behind the carving. Now when you see it on your wanderings, you'll know what it means to us and maybe you'll share a little smiling thought for Elsie.

### Standing together....apart!



Whilst we should perhaps see this challenging period as an opportunity to hunker down and spring clean our homes, some

And as for the children in our households, time to learn some key life skills such as learning to change a plug, make a family meal, tidy bedrooms and hang up clothes (although the latter is probably a bridge too far!). All of the above will be done wearing colourful clothes and sporting a glossy splodge of bright red lipstick....after all history tells us that during the war, red lipstick was commonly used as a tool to boost morale, We have also tapped into the bright sparks in our midst to discover their top tips on how to nurture both mind, body and spirit.

### Take a breath

According to Dionne Sanders, one of Easton's yoga teachers, *Nadhi sodhana* also known as alternative nostril breathing, is something that can benefit everyone. By increasing the amount of oxygen taken into the body, it's believed that this breath can purify the blood, calm the mind and nervous

system and aid a restful night's sleep. **How to do it:** Nadhi sodhana can be done seated or lying down. To start, empty all the air from your lungs. Using the thumb of your dominant hand, block your right nostril and inhale through your left nostril only. Be sure to inhale into your belly, not your chest. Once you are full of breath, seal your left nostril with the ring finger of the same hand, keeping your right nostril closed, and hold the breath for a moment. Then release your thumb




and exhale through your right nostril only. Be sure to exhale all the breath out of the right side and pause before inhaling again through the same side. Seal both nostrils once you've inhaled on the right side and exhaled through the left side. A complete cycle of breath includes an inhalation and exhalation through both nostrils. If you're just starting out, you can do a four-count inhale, holding your breath for four to eight counts, then exhale for four counts. Perform up to ten cycles and notice how your body responds. You may feel more relaxed and calm in both your mind and body.

Reading provides perfect escapism for many. Easton's book club members suggest the following;


The Year of Wonders

she finally escaped over the Pyrenees to Spain. I found Virginia's heroism and bravery both sobering and uplifting, a reminder in these difficult times of the best of our human qualities.

# Rocky Road Biscuits from Miranda Gore Brown's book "Biscuit"



Ingredients
350g chocolate
(200g dark and
150g milk works
well)
150g unsalted
butter

4 tbsp golden syrup

175g rich tea biscuits 350g dried mixed fruit (any mix of fruit, raisins, papaya, apricots, cherries, whatever you've got. Chop them up to sultana sized pieces.)

2 handfuls of mini marshmallows Melt the chocolate, butter and golden syrup gently in a large pan.

Put the biscuits into a bag, seal and then bash with a rolling pin to get a mix of small and large bits. Pour the biscuits into the pan along with the dried fruit. Line a shallow tin with cling film to make it easy to remove. Sprinkle half the marshmallows into the tin and then spread the warm mixture on top. The other marshmallows go on top of the mixture and then push the whole lot firmly into the tin with a palette knife. Chill overnight in the fridge.

Turn out on to a chopping board and cut into slices.

### Crafty Kids...and adults too

Anyone who

wants to join in could make a lovely Spring wreath to decorate the front doors of the Valley. If you have a Christmas wreath that you can repurpose, then do so – simply add some blossoming twigs from the garden, fresh or paper flowers, or just cut out simple egg shapes from tissue paper or card. If you don't have a wreath at home, then cut a handful of bendy twigs and tie them into a loose circle, then decorate.

In the Nordic nations they cut spring branches and hang little eggs from them – why not try the same if you have any budding branches in your garden?. If you're planning on scrambled eggs for supper then simply make two small holes at either end of the egg and blow through one end to get the egg white and yolk out into a bowl. Wash the egg then paint or draw on them with sharpies. You could make one for every member of the family and hang them from the spring branches in a window, so that your friends and neighbours can see them... Carrot & Bunny Baskets:



Take a piece of paper, coloured if you have it (orange or purple for a carrot, pink, grey or white for a bunny). Draw round a small plate,

mark a dot in the centre and draw a straight line to it from one edge. Cut out around the circle and along the line you've made to the middle, put a line of glue or double sided tape along one side of the cut, straight line. Then overlap the paper to form a nice, tight cone, the size and shape of a very chunky carrot and glue or stick it in place. Cut out a straight strip of paper about 3 cm wide and 20 cm long and glue or tape the two ends inside the top of your cone – this forms the handle. Then you can either draw on your own face or cut out the images






supplied. Colour in the carrot leaves and the inner bunny ears, if you like, and then cut out and glue just inside the cone, so they stick out the top. If you don't fancy this but have some paper cups to hand, then you could cut out the bunny, carrot and chick faces and feet to stick to them instead.

Paper Plate Bunny Crowns:

Take a paper plate (or a circle of strong paper) and fold it in half (see Fig I). Draw a smaller circle, the inside rim of the paper plate and sketch out one bunny ear shape in the space inside the smaller circle (see Fig 2) and then cut through these lines on the folded paper plate so that, when it is unfolded, you have two bunny ears popping up out of a paper crown (see Fig 3).

### From our MP

The period since half-term has been rather full-on as the true scale of the Covid-19 outbreak reveals itself.
Clearly this is a fast-moving situation but you can expect to see/hear your MP, as the former Public Health Minister, on the media a fair bit and I will be supporting Ministers so long as they maintain a staged, cool-headed response to whatever the virus brings next.



Alongside fellow MPs from the area, I have also been dealing with the lead up to – and fall out since – the collapse of FlyBe.

The failure of the airline is awful news for Hampshire and, especially of course, for those who face an uncertain future with their jobs as a result. Other airlines picking up some of the routes are welcome. It's worth noting FlyBe are responsible for 95% of flights from Southampton.

Speaking in the House of Commons as the news became known I said it was obvious there is not a queue of airlines wanting to pick up the FlyBe routes but warned the company against blaming its failures solely on the coronavirus which has plunged the industry into even further uncertainty.

The basic truth is, if FlyBe hadn't ever existed, someone would have had to invent it because these routes cannot disappear entirely. Some of my constituents may not be ruing the quieter skies above but we've come to rely on the convenience of a local airport and local businesses were quick to tell me of their concerns.

So I am challenging Ministers to truly understand the FlyBe failure and to look at other parts of the world for help in protecting key short-haul regional travel. The model works brilliantly in the United States where regional airlines, often flying as franchises of the larger carriers, are large successful businesses but FlyBe

The DFT's promised review into regional air connectivity has just become more important than ever and you can rest-assured I will be closely involved and be working closely with Southampton Airport as a major employer – directly and via the supply chain - in this area. I am also very mindful of the environmental aspects here and passionately believe it is for the industry, especially the short-haul regional players, to show the public the work they are doing on sustainable fuels and electric aircraft.

At the end of April we are due to hold our Annual Parish Meeting which is a legal requirement unless the government under emergency powers allows it to be postponed. Unless advertised otherwise this meeting will take place as scheduled but will cover the minimum requirement and unlike in recent years past there will be no guest speaker.

Other Parish Council matters are still ongoing. We continue to try to get various road drains cleared but in the wet weather experienced this winter it is a question of where gets priority and as we have been told before Highways resources are limited. The problem of climate change has been discussed, what we in the Valley might do to help reduce our carbon foot print and also how we might create a wilder environment. A working group of five Parish Councillors has been set up and will be producing an action plan. Please let us know your ideas and if you can help.

### Jackie's County Corner

The County Council declared a cross party Climate Change emergency earlier this year. This month a Council



Climate strategy has been published, consisting of a series of measures to tackle the reduction of the Council's

own carbon footprint, ways to help the public make their own changes, a number of projects to mitigate the possible effects of a possible 4 deg C rise in temperatures and the associated climate changes we would endure (eg a better drainage plan). Controversially, though the strategy has many useful actions, it does not have a deadline date. However it is clear that we must all play our part and I asked specifically how this can be dovetailed with Winchester and other District strategies that have recently been published: all are working towards similar outcomes. We really mustn't duplicate our efforts.

Projects include the forestation of a Country Park, more Electric Vehicle charging points on roadside parking places to add to those being installed by WCC in the city car parks and market towns, providing more plant based meals for school lunches and the relaxation of the ban on wind power on HCC land.

The County and City Councils are looking at ways we can increase Public Transport options, even if for only part of the journey (eg: by providing more Park and Ride). Both the County and City district realise they are each responsible for less than 1% of the County emissions, so it is up to us to think how we can

# From Two of Our City Councillors

I am very aware of the many local groups helping their neighbours. My main concern is that some of those volunteers may feel the need to isolate themselves or may become ill. All





parishes are at varying degrees of developing what are hopefully long-term resilient systems, I am currently acting as a clearing house for good practice, but fully expect that official guidance will be sent out in due course. Meantime, contact me if you think I may have a solution.

River Quality. Thanks to action by the Salmon & Trout Conservation (S&TC), Bakkavor has established a method to prevent their contamination of the upper Itchen. However, there is as yet no commitment to implement this method.

'S&TC has seen the results of trials using ozone which appear to have removed pesticides, herbicides and insecticides to levels below the current limits of detection. This process not only appears to remove problem pesticides washed off imported salad leaves but will also remove toxic chemicals that have leached into the groundwater over previous years. If treatment is implemented, this could mean the discharge would return water to the river in a cleaner state than it came out of Bakkavör's borehole.' More information is available from the S&TC website at www.salmontrout.org and I would encourage residents to sign up to their excellent, free newsletter.

The Winchester Strategic Plan for the next 5 years has been agreed, and the budget to deliver those priorities was adopted on 26 February.






