





VJ Day

VJ day (15 August) was as usual much more low key than VE Day. However, John Lang marked it by circulating, on the Itchen List, a letter written by his father 75 years before. He has kindly agreed to its publication in the News. Ed The letter was written by my father to my mother and dated 15 August

my mother and dated 15 August 1945. We now refer to it as VJ Day - Victory over Japan Day.

single sheet Air Letter Card. My 29 year old naval officer father

was serving at the time in the battleship HMS King George V as the Fleet Aviation Officer to the CinC British Pacific Fleet. At the time the ship was operating off the coast of Japan some 70 miles from Tokyo and, a bit like the forgotten Army in Burma, the Royal Navy's presence in the Pacific theatre has largely been ignored. My mother was living in the family home in the borders of Scotland and totally reliant on the occasional, censored, air mail letter from my father serving in the Far East for news. The following is drawn from the original and is almost exactly as he wrote it.....

"Shortly after I I o'clock this forenoon local time, the signal was hoisted in gaily coloured bunting from masthead and yardarm "Cease hostilities against Japan." I went up on deck to see the memorable sight and decided that whatever the chance of mails were, I must write this evening to you to tell you of the terrific feeling I have of relief and thankfulness. The war is over. Nearly six years ago I walked across the meadows just below your family home In Sussex and heard the sirens wail to mark the beginning of the war.

You were at my side then, and in the many months of fear, unhappiness, boredom and general grimness since, you have never left me. At no time can I ever remember having had any doubt whatsoever as to the ultimate outcome of the war. It was a faith in oneself and the great company of allies and yet, to me, that faith lay in the one place that never failed, never wavered; you. So when I thank almighty God for

everything, I must thank him too for making things easier for me and for providing a real centre for my faith and hope. In spite of a two year separation I feel closer to you than ever.

And now my one job is to make a start in the world for our two sons. We must teach them faith, a raison d'etre and the rest will follow."

I was one of the two sons. I was 4 and my brother was nearly 2.

And as we commemorate VI Day, I can't but help think that with all the uncertainties and anxiety we are all going through today, there are still some valuable lessons to be learned from the past. These are challenging times and it may be difficult for us. But just remember what our parents and grandparents went through those many years ago; long separation, unreliable communications, uncertainty and, given the grave economic situation at the time, a very challenging future. The Hollow for Charity

I surprised myself when I worked out that in our five previous plays, the Southwood Players have raised some £50,000 for charity. It is one of the things we can be proud of as well as the community involvement - and then we get to the acting. This is what we cast tend to think it is all about. Amateur dramatics can be just an escape for the actors but our three afternoon performances of Agatha Christie's The Hollow on September 11th to 13th will be different. They are also about getting the community out of lockdown to have some fun and about helping out charities who have been so hard hit by the pandemic. In September we need to start the performances earlier than for our previous July plays. Picnics will be afternoon tea and drinks and social distancing will be the necessity on and off stage.

It has been a torrid time for the arts and performances and events of almost all sorts. Southwood Players decided back in June to start Zoom rehearsals in the hope that we could be ready to put on the play as soon as it was possible. Waiting until next year was a poor option. September is challenging, but seemed right as our part of returning to some form of normality. Starting rehearsals on our terrace soon showed both how complicated social distancing is, in spite of all the hard work already put in by our longsuffering director Anna McGowan, and the shortage of time for the team to

design and build the set and collect costumes and props. Who mentioned time to learn our lines? Sadly we lost two of our original cast to holidays, but there are some new faces including Phoebe Culshaw, James and Natalie Paterson and Cat Kennedy, continuing our tradition of having a female police sergeant.

We return to Agatha Christie after the gossipy humour of Noel Coward and Oscar Wilde. Choosing plays is not easy, not just to fit the characters to the available actors, but to find a single set that can be made to work on the odd shape of the Southwood House terrace. We return happily to Agatha Christie following our success with Murder at the Vicarage. While Christie does not write as a humourist, she has a fine observation of character and its foibles and that provides the laughs. She wrote the script for the play herself and retained the characterisation and humour that has often been lost in other adaptions of her books for the screen. The book features Hercule Poirot but she wrote him out of the play – perhaps just as well that we did not have to cast the little Belgian with the awkward walk. Southwood Players was set up with the intention of raising money for local charities. The Itchen Valley Churches have always been beneficiaries in part because the church going community has always been so much involved. Our other long term beneficiary has been the Winchester branch of the Multiple Sclerosis Society who have used the money to help support specialist classes at Hobbs Rehabilitation, the highly regarded neural specialists in Martyr Worthy. This year we have added the Winchester Young Carers, who have been providing support to up to one hundred 8 to 18 year olds who

Easton Village Hall

The hall has been closed since Lock Down, but permission has now been given by the government for village halls and community centres to reopen, with appropriate Covid Safe precautions in place.

We propose to re-open Easton Village Hall on Monday 21st September, initially only for regular user groups who have undertaken an appropriate risk-assessment and put in place their own Covid Safe precautions.

With apologies, the hall will not be available for individual bookings for the time being, but we hope to re-open for such bookings in due course.

The Annual General Meeting, which had to be postponed from May, will now take place in October or November - a date will be circulated in due course.

As an eligible village hall/community centre, our application for the Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Grant of £10,000 from the Government was successful - this has been most welcome as it will support the finances of the Hall through the Covid crisis, by compensating for the loss of income associated with the Lockdown and beyond, and there being no Village Fete or Pantomime this year.

Meander with Me

Walking through the quiet lanes that wind through a village in the Itchen Valley, in the early hours of a summer morning, the only sounds I hear are the delicate musical notes of the songbirds, as they tune up, ready to join in with the dawn symphony.

When landowners and farmers embrace the concept of achieving

productive fields whilst providing habitats and food sources for birds. insects and small mammals - in the form of wild flower margins which also act as corridors between fields and copses - the natural world benefits immensely. The resulting abundance of wildlife and beautiful landscapes gladdens our eyes and senses, and benefits us as well. Park Farm is one such place that has amazed, and delighted me,



every morning that I have decided to meander along its footpaths, and I have tried to make the most of this special place, by photographing what I see. As the sun rises over the horizon, sitting in the long grasses amongst the wildflowers, it is the perfect time to capture the sunbeams that bathe the flowers in a golden glow. The butterflies, their wings still wet from

dewdrops, are still, and, with their wings backlit, are like glamorous models posing on nature's fashion catwalk. Leaning in closely with my macro lens, I hope to capture a transient moment of beauty, before the butterflies float away.

I walk on to find there are bees gathering the pollen in the flowers of the borage, and I snap away, thankful that they are only



intent on their breakfast, and pay me no mind.

As I continue my walk, scanning the path ahead, I am suddenly aware of a strange chomping, scratching noise. I follow the sound to its source, and look up. In the green canopy of a tree sits a squirrel, carefully balanced on a tree branch, with a walnut between its hands, chewing vigorously. It is completely focused on its meal and ignores the click of my camera as it spits out the bits it doesn't like, which



fall down on me. Oh well.

There are also two young squirrels playing hide and seek around the tree trunk, but when their mum takes a break from her breakfast, she suddenly



notices me, sounds a warning, and up the tree they scamper to join her. I sigh contentedly as I count myself very fortunate when I am lucky enough to observe a wild animal's natural behaviour.

Strolling along the grassy verges I come upon a large brown hare. He stares at me for a few moments before deciding that I am of no interest, and hops off, probably to find something tasty for breakfast.



The sun is beaming down on me and I realise that it's been a couple of hours since I first set off on my walk. There's a loud rumble from my tummy and I decide that it's not only the animals that are hungry this morning, and it is time to go home.

A cutting garden

What or who inspired you to plant a cutting garden? — A couple of years ago my sister-in-law planted a collection of Sarah Raven seeds in her allotment & throughout the summer brought me wonderfully colourful bunches of flowers.

How did you plan it? - I spent a long time browsing through SR catalogues & trying to decide which seeds to get. There are so many to choose from that I simply selected a variety of colours and shapes to experiment with.

Did you grow your own plants? Any tips? – I grew everything from seed in my greenhouse, I would advise against sowing too early (i.e. before April) just because the weather is fine (like this year). They germinate more quickly once daylight lengthens and you don't risk needing to plant them out before the last frost. It's tempting to plant too many seedlings – you really only need 4-5 plants of each variety.

How much time has it taken? This year, more than usual because of the lack of rain & the need to water regularly, although the dry weather has kept the weeds down.

What is your favourite flower combination? I prefer a varied bunch



often with eight or more varieties in a mixture of colours, but next year I will be looking for a couple of plants with good foliage for the flowers to sit amongst.

Which flowers would you recommend as the most rewarding? Malope in a big bunch look stunning, but antirrhinums, salvias, nicotianas & cosmos keep flowering all summer if you keep up with the cutting.



Have you had a heart breaking failure? I found both ammi & scabiosa atropurpurea difficult to germinate & failed with both.

What occasions have you marked with bunches of flowers? I normally just give them as gifts for friends and family!

Will you do it again next year? Yes and will have fun experimenting with some new varieties.

What flowers do you find last best in a vase? Nicotiana, malope, antirrhinum and of course agapanthus.

Do you have any tips on how to make cut flowers last longer? Pick them at the beginning or end of the day – not in the full sun and put them straight into fresh water. Make sure the

vase is properly clean, remove any lower foliage so there is none in the water and change the water in the vase daily.



The Practical Gardener

Patrick Appleby.

There must be few who could deny that the climate is changing with mid-August being so hot. The recycling of water used in gardens seems to me to be an essential for



the environment yet few politicians ever seem to mention it. Nature is incredibly resilient, yet many plants in recent weeks would not survive without plenty of watering. So, I guess I make a plea to save and recycle water. I remember this is mandatory in Australia, not for the sake of gardens but to fight fire. Maybe soon, that too could be an issue. One of the issues with watering is that we all use sprays

but ideally, we should water the soil. An expert reminded me recently that you must not water every day, plants need a break.

For those who enjoy colour, annual flowers are a must and one that is new to me Chrysanthemum Sunset is a delight.



August is possibly the peak period for colour and many plants will only continue to flower if the dead ones are removed. So much time and care is needed with the scissors. This is

particularly the case with osteospermum, sold as an annual but will certainly keep another year. I was encouraged to continue to sow perennials and so far in the greenhouse the results are good. Summer is a good time to start these seeds into growth, most especially wallflowers

and Sweet William. I



now avoid big seed trays but rather reuse the multi pocket trays that I have saved from an earlier purchase. Using smaller pockets makes an easier way to separate the small plants later on.

To continue the whitefly debate, I will confirm there is no perfect solution. Whitefly, a bit like coronavirus, are difficult to

Butchers of Distinction Home Made Pies. Ready Meals A Variety of Seasonal Game kill off. I have a new idea. I bought a small cheap plastic housing (socalled mini greenhouse). I put infected plants like my pelargoniums, inside together with my sulphur



burner. A night in an enclosed environment appears to do no harm to the plant but it does eradicate the whitefly.

There has been lots to harvest in the vegetable garden. All the onions are now dried and stored and the crop has been excellent. Ditto with main crop spuds, rather early but all is well. Both I hope will store for 6 months or more. Everyone grows courgettes and complains they have too many. This year I have put pumpkins and butternut squash into the mix but neither seems very successful. In parallel but in pots, I have tried aubergine and these are at last producing some fruit.

I grow lots of beans: runners, climbing French and dwarf varieties. Can I recommend picking these when young as the flavour is so much better. The smaller beans also freeze well, so in December instead of buying them in the shops from Kenya, have your own stored crop! For just a few months, blanching and all that stuff is unnecessary.

The hard fruit crop this year is astonishing, apples and pears in abundance and buckets of windfalls every day. So too the soft fruits, as raspberries continue and the blackberries start. I had to put a notice

on my raspberries to remind birds they were an autumn crop which is never touched. Of course, the old canes from summer fruits have been cut back and

shredded. This summer my home-made cages have proved their worth, they keep the birds off the crop and are easy to access.

It's a great time to take photos of the garden, then later on maybe some plants could be moved or divided or changed to a different colour. I can also say that my experiment with planting crops close together has worked well. As I harvest carrots, so the leeks have space to grow up. I have photographed some of my crops. Enjoy. Tony Gaster.

A bird in the hand

If you go down to the river today, you're sure of a big surprise. This was indeed the case when early one Sunday morning I came across a group of cars parked by the bridge near Avington trout fishery. Early morning poachers I wondered? Fortunately, no.

Encountering a long net strung over the bridge, a friendly face soon came into view. He was with a group of bird ringers. They were on their occasional outing to ring as many birds as they could find to add to the already large database of ornithological information for the area.

The nine nets were strung out across flight paths alongside the many braids of the river. Although they had been



Whilst I was there, they caught a wren and a chiffchaff. These were identified, ringed, aged and sexed, before being measured and weighed. The birds were then released. These rings are individually numbered and recorded so any future nettings can be compared to



the original location. Good eyesight or a strong magnifying glass is a necessity given the minute size of the rings! Apparently most birds caught in these nets are unringed specimens, usually only a few months old although some birds can go for years without being ringed. Almost all previously ringed birds captured are ones that have been seen there before. However, only the previous week, a reed warbler with a French ring had been netted.



I was told that in general bird populations are on the decline (tell that to the pigeons!). This can often be attributed to the loss of habitat, and

not necessarily in England. Birds that migrate overseas for the winter often find that their home last year has been destroyed. Yes, they can usually breed successfully over here but they may have nowhere to go to escape the darker months of the year.







Apple Mountain

With so many people having surplus apples this year and offering them to neighbours it would seem perverse not to include an apple recipe. This is adapted from Supercook, 'An encyclopaedia of world cooking in 112 weekly parts', some of which I inherited from my grandmother. Fd

Ingredients

3lb (1.4kg) eating apples 4 fl oz (115ml) water 11b (450gm) Jam sugar (this is sugar with added pectin, available in supermarkets at this time of year, or you can buy liquid pectin) Juice of a lemon and grated rind 4oz (115gm) sultanas or raisins, or a mix of the two 2 fl oz (60ml) sweet sherry or cooking brandy

10 fl oz (300ml) double cream Chocolate, grated or curls, to decorate

Method:

Put sultanas/raisins to soak in the sweet sherry or brandy in a 1½ pint bowl.

Put the water, sugar and lemon juice into a large pan, heat and stir to dissolve the sugar, then remove from heat

Peel and core the apples and chop, putting them into the syrup as you cut to prevent them going brown.

Put the pan back on the stove, bring to the boil and boil for 20 minutes stirring all the time to prevent burning on the base.

Sieve the apple pulp if necessary, cool slightly. Stir in the soaked fruit and alcohol and grated lemon peel. Line the bowl with cling film and pour in the apple mixture. Chill at least 5 hours before serving.

Then turn out, remove cling film and cover completely with whipped cream to make a mountain. Decorate liberally with chocolate leaving the very top uncovered for a snowy peak.
